The Virginia Master Naturalist (VMN) program is a statewide corps of trained volunteers providing natural resource education, citizen science, and stewardship in their communities. The Fairfax Chapter is active in Falls Church, Fairfax City and County, and surrounding areas.

2022 Activity Highlights

- Volunteers assisted the Plant NOVA Trees effort by documenting trees at risk from invasive vines, providing educational information to homeowners, and removing vines from hundreds of trees in 12 local parks.
- Volunteers partnered with Nature Forward at the Hybla Valley Community Center to provide information in Spanish and English about the importance of clean water and the Little Hunting Creek Watershed that runs through the neighborhood.



Fairfax Master Naturalist volunteers led kayak-based interpretive programs at Mason Neck State Park, engaging diverse park visitors in learning more about park resources.
